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**Mrs. Ed Hartsough
 Dies at Wilcox Home**
 Funeral at 2 p.m. Saturday—Mus-
 band and One Son
 Survive

Mrs. Ed Hartsough, 46 years old, died at 4 o'clock this morning at her home in Wilcox following an illness of cancer. Mrs. Hartsough had been ill eighteen months.

Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon at the M. E. Church in Wilcox, conducted by Dr. C. C. James, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Maryville. Burial will be in the Wilcox cemetery.

Mrs. Hartsough was born July, 1880, and with the exception of a few years' residence in St. Joseph, had lived in the Wilcox vicinity all her life. Her marriage to Mr. Hartsough took place May 13, 1906. Mr. Hartsough and one son, Charles Edwin, 5 years old, survive. She also leaves her mother, Mrs. C. C. Hainline, one sister, Mrs. B. K. Ferguson, and a brother, Fred Hainline, of Wilcox.

**Edwin Hartsough
 Is Dead at 71 Years**

Edwin W. Hartsough, 71 years old, a retired railroad man, died yesterday at his home, 2907 Olive street.

Born in Hardin County, Ohio, Mr. Hartsough had been a resident of St. Joseph 65 years. He entered the railroad business in 1900 when he was employed by the Burlington railroad at the joint railway offices at the stock yards. He remained there until 1907 and in 1910 became a switchman at the St. Joseph terminal. From 1929 until 1937, Mr. Hartsough was employed by the Rock Island. He served as yard clerk at the yard office of the St. Joseph terminal from 1943 until September, 1946, when he retired.

Mr. Hartsough was a member of the First Christian Church. He is survived by one son, Charles Hartsough, Phoenix, Ariz.; one sister, Mrs. Katherine McKee, Los Angeles, and one granddaughter. The body is at the Meterhoffer-Fleeman mortuary.
